

When the hospice concept was emerging in the U.S. in the early 1970s it was mostly a service delivered by nonprofits – there was no National Hospice Organization, Medicare was not paying for end-of-life care, and volunteers did most, or, all of the care delivery. In the decades since, the modern hospice philosophy spread, became an accepted part of care practices, and morphed into the hospice of today...


Specialized care for dying patients, their families, caregivers, and/or other loved ones continues to focus on pain management, distressing symptom control, emotional and spiritual support, and personal goals. Most hospice care continues to happen in homes. However, nowadays, most of this care is delivered by a Medicare-certified organization with an interdisciplinary team of mostly staff and only a few volunteers. Fewer and fewer hospices remain nonprofits, and almost none remain independent.

In this day and age, it is tremendously rewarding to be a part of VHOCC, which not only remains a nonprofit, but also independent, and community focused. Our organization stays committed to the philosophy that Dr. Elizabeth Kübler Ross and Dame Cicely Saunders birthed, and that Rose Crumb envisioned for Clallam County! We strive to meet standards of practice and are dedicated to what is best for the patient. We practice with an interdisciplinary team of staff and an extensive group of volunteers. We endure because this community is generous in supporting us and we focus on returning that generosity as care for our friends and neighbors.



Did you know?


- **30.5%** of Clallam County's population is ≥65 (15.9% of WA is ≥65)



People often ask me, where does all the money come from to keep Volunteer Hospice going? This question usually comes right after someone has used a hospital bed or wheelchair (at no charge) or after their loved one was cared for (at no charge) by skilled, loving nurses, aides and volunteers for weeks or more.

There's a sense of disbelief that in today's world, so much is offered with no follow-up bill in the mail or paperwork to fill out.

The answer is simple. We exist because of everyday people: you, our neighbors, their friends.

People walk in our office and hand us a twenty-dollar bill, checks arrive in the mail with notes of gratitude attached, others designate VHOCC in their wills and some people make monthly contributions. This quilt of support is stitched together to pay staff, keep the lights on, and put gas in our delivery vehicles.

In 2024 we tried something new to raise funds and to get the word out about what we do, we hosted an online auction. It was lots of fun, we met new friends and raised just over \$25,000!
